ADDRESS

Clinical Manifestations of SDOH

PROS

- Manageable scope
- Modest upfront investment
- Quick economic wins

CONS

- Limited impact/ROI
- Short-term shelf-life
- Unsustainable funding

METRIC FOCUS

Primarily cost-based health system outcomes

ALIGN

Social Needs Data and Stakeholders

PROS

- Intervention beyond the clinical setting
- Engagement of community stakeholders
- Improved patient-level outcomes and costs

CONS

- Can be resource intensive (eg, IT equipment, training)
- Often conflated with community-level solutions

METRIC FOCUS

Mix of health system outcomes and integration with community partners

ANCHOR

Community-wide **SDOH** Initiatives



- Ability to address health inequities
- Diverse funding options
- Improvement in broad community health

CONS

Tough-to-track metrics
